Notes from St Vladimir's Orthodox Theological Seminary by Seminarian David Rodney Fox

Four days a week I leave at 6 a.m., drive over the George Washington Bridge just as the sun is rising over New York, and, on most days, arrive in time for Matins at 7:30. The music is incredible, the priests and deacons take turns serving, and the students take turns preaching.

After Matins, I offer my own petitions, remembering you in Philadelphia, and after a quick bite, I go to classes, such as Canon Law (a practical theology class learning to serve), a class on the theology of SS. Symeon the New Theologian, Gregory Palamas, and Nicholas Cabasilos (how theology comes through prayer and worship), Byzantine Chant and American Church History. I have learned about Archbishop Noli and the Albanian Archdiocese: did you know Bishop Noli translated Shakespeare into Albanian and actually served as Prime Minister of Albania for a short time?

In between classes I read, do research, write papers, or work on my dissertation.

At five p.m., we attend Vespers, celebrating the saint for the day or one of the Saints of North America, and afterward I leave for home, happy to see Kerri, getting there in time to tuck the children into bed at 7 p.m.

Last week, after Divine Liturgy on the Feast of The Protection of the Theotokos, I was walking around the beautiful new library, by the icons of SS. Herman, Innocent, Tikhon, Peter the Aleut, reading out loud one of St. Symeon's Hymns to Christ, whom he calls "the humble God," thankful to experience study finally as prayer.

Thank you, friends of SS. Peter and Paul, and may God bless you for all you have done to help make this possible!

Metropolitan's Letter for the Annual Christmas Stocking Project

Reverend Fathers and Dearly Beloved in the Lord:

I am happy to once again ask your support for the Annual Christmas Stocking Project. I wish to offer my sincere thanks to all of you who made last year's program a success despite the slower economy. With your help, I am confident that we can look forward to another successful year.

In my recent visits to Russia, Ukraine and Poland, I received warm words of gratitude for the Christmas gifts that have been received in the past. My brother hierarchs assured me that, for the children in orphanages, those still in treatment from the aftereffects of Chernobyl, those in village parishes, the gifts are a highlight of their Christmas celebrations. In addition to the countries mentioned above, this year's Christmas stockings (or an equivalent gift) will go to children in Albania, Belarus, Slovakia, and some of the remote villages in Alaska.

I encourage you to engage your young people in creative efforts to raise funds for the Christmas stockings and gifts. The enthusiasm and fellowship these projects can generate are felt not only by the youth and young adults who become involved, but also encompass the entire parish community.

The cost to make and send each stocking (or an equivalent gift) is \$4.50. \$45.00 will provide for 10 children, \$450.00 for 100 children. We ask you to plan your projects and collections early in the fall. Please send your donations to the Chancery Office, to the attention of Mrs. Arlene Kallaur, as close as possible to October 31, 2003.

Please join me in continuing to provide this special joy for the children by supporting this important project — one that strengthens the ties between the Orthodox Church in America and its sister Churches overseas. 

Great Martyr Demetrius, the Myrrh-streamer



Saint Demetrius was a Thessalonian, a most pious son of pious and noble parents, and a teacher of the Faith of Christ. When Maximian first came to Thessalonica in 190, he raised the Saint to the rank of Duke of Thessaly. But when it was discovered that the Saint was a Christian, he was arrested and kept bound in a bath-house. While the games were under way in the city, Maximian was a spectator there. A certain friend of his, a barbarian who was a notable wrestler, Lyaeus by time, waxing haughty because of the height and strength of his body, boasted in the stadium and challenged the citizens to a contest with him. All that fought with him were defeated. Seeing this, a certain youth named Nestor, acquaintance of Demetrius', came to the Saint in the bath-house and asked his blessing to fight Lyaeus single-

handed. Receiving this blessing and sealing himself with the sign of the precious Cross, he presented himself in the stadium, and said, "O God of Demetrius, help me!" and straightway he engaged Lyaeus in combat and smote him with a mortal blow to the heart, leaving the former boaster lifeless upon the earth. Maximian was sorely grieved over this, and when he learned who was the cause of this defeat, he commanded straightway and Demetrius was pierced with lances while he was yet in the bath-house, As for Nestor, Maximian commanded that he be slain with his own sword.
