Father Stephen's Message to the Faithful

The bread in your cupboard belongs to the hungry person. The coat hanging in your closet unused belongs to the person who needs it. The shoes rotting in your closet belong to the person with no shoes. The money which you put in the bank belongs to the poor.

You do wrong to everyone you could help but fail to help.

In Memorium: +The Very Rev. Victor F. George

WORCESTER, MA [OCA Communications] -- The Very Rev. Victor F. George, 78, reposed of heart failure at the University of Massachusetts Memorial Hospital on Wednesday, August 25, 2004.

A Worcester native, Father George was an alumnus of Clark University, Illinois State University, and Holy Cross Greek Orthodox School of Theology. He was ordained to the Diaconate and Holy Priesthood by His Eminence, Metropolitan Anthony [Bashir] of the Antiochian Orthodox Archdiocese in 1952, after which he served Antiochian parishes in Illinois and Pennsylvania.

In 1976, Father George was received into the Albanian Archdiocese of the Orthodox Church in America, in which he served parishes in New York, NY; Rochester, NY; and Boston, MA. For over 25 years he served Saint Elia Church, Jamestown, NY.

He was elevated to the dignity of archpriest by His Beatitude, Metropolitan Theodosius in 1986. In addition, he was awarded the right to wear the palitza in 1992 and the jeweled cross in 1995. On his 50th Anniversary of ordination in 2002, he was awarded a citation signed by the members of the Holy Synod of Bishops of the Orthodox Church in America.

Father George was a devoted pastor, well known among his brother clergy as a missionary priest, always willing to travel far and wide to serve distant parishes and faithful in need of pastoral care. Well-versed in theology and history, he was fluent in ten languages and capable of celebrating services in Arabic, Greek, Albanian and Slavonic. A perpetual student, he continued

to attend university classes into his late 70s. He was an inspiration to younger clergy, a loyal servant of his bishop, and a trusted companion with his colleagues.

Archpastoral Message of His Beatitude, Metropolitan HERMAN for the September FOS Appeal

September 2004

Dearly Beloved in the Lord,

The theme chosen for the 14th All-American Council is Our Church and the Future. This is an exciting theme that will allow us to explore not only where we came from as a Church, but also where we presently are and most importantly where we are going. It is a theme that invites us to reflect upon the past and present and to act to shape the future work and mission of the Church and how the Fellowship of Orthodox Stewards can support that work and mission.

There is no doubt that the decisions we make today will shape the future direction of our Church. I liken this to a road map with many different roads. Some roads will lead us to our intended destination, others, if taken, will lead to a dead-end. Yet there is another alternative, if we just stand still and do nothing, then we will go no further.

The road that leads us to the Kingdom of Heaven, although a narrow path it is well lit with the Light of Christ, with His saints as sentinels pointing us in the right direction. IOCC Responding to Victims of Iraqi Church Bombings

For immediate release - August 5, 2004

Baghdad (IOCC) - The broken stained glass has been swept up, the structural damage is being repaired, but the Christian community of Iraq will take a long time to recover from the August 1 car bomb attacks.

Iraqi Christians, a minority in this predominantly Muslim country, have been left reeling from the large-scale violence against their communities in Baghdad and Mosul. International Orthodox Christian Charities (IOCC), a humanitarian aid agency of Orthodox Christians, is working to meet the immediate needs of those most affected by the attacks.

Several of the damaged churches in Baghdad are part of a local ecumenical network of IOCC partners that has been active in distributing food and hygiene kits to Iraqis in need over the past year. Since the bombings, IOCC staff, led by Dr. Saad Gedeon, have visited the churches and interviewed their priests and bishops.

"We are assessing the needs of the families of those killed or injured by these senseless acts of brutality, and IOCC will be providing assistance to them as we are able," said Dr. Gedeon, program coordinator for IOCC Iraq. "Christians around the world must stand with those who have fallen victim to this brutal violence, letting them know that we are with them not only in thought and prayer, but also in deed, in the days and weeks to come as they work to rebuild."

Despite the violence and unrest, IOCC continues its work in Iraq. Through IOCC's distribution network, hundreds of low-income Iraqi families receive food and other necessities. Victims of the recent attacks will receive food parcels, hygiene kits and other forms of assistance, depending on their needs.

IOCC is one of four implementing partners for the relief alliance Action by Churches Together (ACT) in Iraq and is working in partnership with the United Methodist Committee on Relief.

Beginning operations in Iraq in April 2003, IOCC has been distributing food, hygiene and first-aid parcels through the Middle East Council of Churches and its network of churches and mosques.

IOCC is the humanitarian aid agency of the Standing Conference of Canonical Orthodox Bishops in the Americas (SCOBA). All of its assistance is delivered solely on the basis of need.



The Protection of the Most Holy Theotokos

The Son of God chose to take on human nature for the salvation of mankind, and chose as His Mother the All-Pure Virgin Mary, who alone was worthy to give birth to the Source of purity and holiness.



The Most Holy Virgin Mary was born in the small city of Galilee, Nazareth. Her parents were Righteous Joachim of the tribe of the Prophet-King David, and Anna from the tribe of the First Priest Aaron. The couple was without child, since St. Anna was barren.

Having reached old age, Joachim and Anna did not lose hope in God's mercy. They had strong faith that for God everything is possible. Joachim and Anna vowed to dedicate the child which the Lord might give them, to the service of God in the Temple.

Childlessness was considered among the Hebrew nation as a Divine punishment for sin. On one of the feastdays at the Temple in Jerusalem Joachim brought his sacrifice to offer to God, but the High Priest would not accept it, considering him to be unworthy since he was childless. Deep in grief, Joachim went into the wilderness, and there he

prayed with tears to the Lord for a child. Never once did Anna complain against the Lord, but rather she prayed to ask God's mercy on her family.

The Lord fulfilled her petitions when the pious couple had attained to extreme old age and prepared themselves by virtuous life for a sublime calling: to be the parents of the Most Holy Virgin Mary, the future Mother of the Lord Jesus Christ.

The Archangel Gabriel brought Joachim and Anna the joyous message that their prayers were heard by God, and of them would be born a most blessed daughter Mary, through Whom would come the Salvation of all the World.

The Most Holy Virgin Mary surpassed in purity and virtue not only all mankind, but also the angels. She was manifest as the living Temple of God, so the Church sings in its festal hymns: "the East Gate... bringing Christ into the world for the salvation of our souls". The Theotokos is revealed to all of us by grace as a merciful Intercessor and Mother, to Whom we have recourse with filial devotion.
